Oxiclean 2-in-1 Stain Fighter Power Paks pouches

Oxiclean White Revive Laundry Stain Remover Power Paks pouches

Arm & Hammer Baking Soda pouches (large bags used for cleaning and swimming pools)

Meet Our Neighbor Katia — Covenant has recently become a member congregation of the Interfaith Sanctuary Coalition (ISC), a group of Athens area faith communities committed to offering friendship, hope, and compassionate support to our undocumented neighbors. Through ISC we have met Katia, a 19 year-old mother of two who has lived in Athens for 17 years. Her husband was deported to Mexico a few months ago, leaving Katia with her mother and sister to try and make ends meet. Currently Katia is working some shifts at a local flea market. In the fall she will be returning to school, seeking to complete her high school education through an on-site, on-line program at the ACC School District office. Here are some ways we can help Katia immediately and in the months to come:

\*By providing Lyft gift cards or a bus pass so that she can get to work and

run errands

\*By offering rides to school several times a week in the fall (once we know her schedule we will set up a Sign-Up genius for volunteer drivers)

\*By supplying her with plastic storage bins and age-appropriate books for her children (she has a one year-old boy and a three year-old girl)

\*By sharing information about local, private cosmetology schools and helping fund her tuition

Thank you for prayerfully considering entering into this relationship with Katia and her family. In these days when many of us are rightly focused on legislative efforts to enable parents and children to stay together along our borders, this is a chance to extend gospel love to a vulnerable family that is already here.

YOUTH NEWS! Massanetta springs with faith formation, bv The energy and enthusiasm of young people is contagious--especially when there are over 200 mostly middle schoolers who gather together in one place. At 6am on Thursday, June 21, Kim Ness, youth director at First Pres, and I, loaded 11 middle school youth from both churches onto a 15 passenger bus that drives as smoothly as my minivan. From Covenant were Syndey Braswell, McKenzie Redish, Emma Rentz, and Owen Barnett. Less than 9 hours later we were in the beauty of the Shenandoah Valley--a place Presbyterians were drawn to in large numbers as early as the 17th century. And for good reason with its rolling hills covered in a lush green, deeper in some ways than what we have here in Georgia. The forecast called for rain for much of our 4 days, but we weren't going to let that put a damper on things. How could we when some 20 enthusiastic high school juniors and seniors were responsible for energizing everyone, leading workshops, and assisting with worship and keynotes? A very impressive group of students! Half of those high schoolers were group leaders, called enablers, and were assigned and responsible for some 10 youth along with two adults. Each group consisted for the most part of youth and adults from churches other than their own--so we made lots of new friends. The enablers jobs were to help us process experiences of our day, primarily the keynote portion, and guide us through our time together. Our enabler was a recent high school graduate named Emma, who is headed off to UNC Chapel Hill in the fall. She made a lasting impact on all of us. The middlers in my group--engaged and enthusiastic--came from Presbyterian churches in North Carolina, Virginia, Delaware, Pennsylvania, and Florida. The keynote speaker, the Rev. Allysen Schaaf, is on staff at the church where I was baptized and grew up, Decatur Presbyterian. It was great to have her leadership, as she effectively emphasized the theme of the week which was inspired by Isaiah 43:1-3: "But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Saviour."

lots of camp food (which I thought was just fine, but I'm not picky and I could avoid eating meat which is a goal of mine in 2018);

*NRSV* Within these verses emerged essential aspects of our identity--we are created, claimed and called by God. As young people navigate the challenges of adolescence, these are foundational aspects of their (and all of our) self understanding. These themes were emphasized in the workshops we participated in. There were some 15 workshops of which groups participated in 4. The emphases of those I participated in included: music as prayer, created as creative beings, and consideration of the role of social media in our lives. Of course, no camp and conference is complete without essentials such as:

Lots of recreation, including a giant slip and slide (yes, I slipped and "slided"), silly games involving shaving cream and sprays, water games, jump ropes, a gaga pit, canoeing, and swimming; and, Barracks which can withstand the countless number of young people who stay in them year after year.

A neat service project was incorporated into one night called, "Rise Against Hunger." Any process engineer would have been impressed with the streamlining of this food packaging project as we donned cooking caps and gloves and bagged and boxed 10,000 meals of a vegetable rice mixture, while pop songs old and new were blasting overhead. The kids loved it. The final night closed with a dance party--a well chaperoned middle school dance party, need I say more? After which-and it somehow segued--all 200 plus of us gathered in a large circle in a field under a clear sky for a moving candlelight vespers service. We slept well that night.

Sunday morning, we packed up, then joined together for closing worship with communion. We said our goodbyes, then off we went arriving back to Athens just after 9pm. I was so pleased to participate with our young people in this way. Presbyterian camps are done in a unique way, and for this become special places which shape the faith of our children to engage the world as an expression of that faith. Thanks be to God.

Bathroom Renovation update from Pam Knox as of June 16 I've been asked a number of questions about the status of the bathroom renovation project and thought I would provide a short discussion of what has been done, how it is being paid for, and when it will be finished. Most of this is based on information from Hank Tweedell and Karen Wetherington. Information is also available in Session minutes from February 4, 2018. The work is being done by Grahl Construction. There are two different projects underway. A shower is being added to the basement next to the WORM cooking room for use by IHN visitors. The cost of this portion of the renovation is approximately \$25,000. Upstairs, the Fellowship Hall bathrooms have been gutted and new men's and women's rooms are in the process of being plumbed, with three stall in each bathroom plus new double sinks along with mirrors. At the time I looked at it, the rough plumbing was in and the contractors were about to pour the cement floors. Once those are dry, they will frame in the walls and install tiles and fixtures. The process of connecting the Fellowship Hall bathrooms to the kitchen sewer line should help alleviate ponding of water near the entrance to the portico in the parking lot when they resurface that part of the lot. The cost of the upstairs renovation was estimated to be approximately \$95,000, but some additional costs were incurred when asbestos was discovered in the demolition and had to be removed. The original sewer line from Gaines School Road to the Fellowship Hall bathrooms was determined by camera inspection to have collapsed (which is why they were shut down earlier than expected), and replacing that would have cost about \$100,000 due to the depth of the line, so Covenant is fortunate that the separate sewer line from the kitchen was already available. Hank was not sure when the work would be completed, but it could be as early as three weeks. There should be no problem finishing by the end of July, well before the fall season begins. Costs for the renovation project will be somewhat higher than originally expected due to the discovery of the asbestos as well as changes made in the design of the project by Session as the contract was finalized. Most of the cost will be covered by the Jubilee Campaign account, which also covered the roof replacement. Some of the Jubilee money is also reserved to renovate the playground, so additional money for the bathroom renovation will come from the Capital Reserve Fund. Jim Bowden has also requested that some additional funds be made available from the Bowden Book Fund. At this point I cannot tell you the exact amounts from each source since the final bill has not yet come in.
